

tard, in exchange therefor, for one hundred and fifty acres of land in said county, which land was afterward sold by the said Thomas Greer aforesaid, to James Greer, and the said Thomas Greer also sold to John Greer, one hundred acres of land in the county aforesaid; and further, that the said Thomas Greer afterwards died intestate, without carrying the said contracts into effect: Therefore,

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* Rebecca Greer, administratrix of Thomas Greer, late of North-East township, in the county of Erie, deceased, and David Caldwell, administrator as aforesaid, and John M'Cord, guardian of the minor children of the said Thomas Greer, deceased, he, and they are hereby authorized to execute a deed of conveyance to Arnold Custard, for one hundred acres of land lying in the county of Erie, bounded north on lake Erie, west on lands of William Baird, and on the south and east by lands of Thomas Greer, deceased: *Provided,* That said Arnold Custard shall make and execute to James Greer, a deed for one hundred and fifty acres of land, lying in the county of Erie, bounded east by lands of Francis Brawly, south by lands of Thomas Melon, and on the west by lands of Abraham aforesaid.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said Rebecca Greer, David Caldwell and John M'Cord, as aforesaid, are hereby authorized to execute a deed of conveyance to John Greer, of the county of Erie, for one hundred acres of land in North-East township, Erie county, bounded on the north by lands of Arnold Custard, east by lands lately the property of Thomas Greer, deceased, on the south by lands of Abraham Custard, and on the west by lands of the Pennsylvania Population Company; which deeds, when so executed, shall be considered as good and available in law, as if they had been executed by the said Thomas Greer in his life time.

## CHAPTER CXVII.

An ACT granting further powers to the president, managers and company of the Centre turnpike road, leading from Reading to Sunbury, and the president, managers and company of the Perkiomin and Reading turnpike road.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* the president, managers and company of the Centre turnpike road,

the road. leading from Reading to Sunbury, be, and they are hereby authorized to extend their turnpike road into the borough of Reading, to the intersection of Callowhill and Margaret street, under the same provisions, privileges and restrictions as are contained in the act which authorized their incorporation, and the supplements thereto: *Provided*, That no toll gate shall be erected or maintained within the borough of Orwigsburg.

turnpike. **SECT. II.** *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid*, That the president, managers and company of the Perkiomin and Reading turnpike road be, and they are hereby authorized to extend their turnpike road into the borough of Reading, to the intersection of Penn street and Prince street, under the same provisions, privileges and restrictions as are contained in the act which authorized their incorporation, and the supplement thereto: *Provided*, That no toll gate shall be erected within the borough of Reading.

company. **SECT. III.** *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid*, That the president, managers and company of the Perkiomin and Reading turnpike road, from and after the passing of this act, shall have like power and privileges to those given and granted to the president managers and company of the Berks and Dauphin turnpike road, by the thirteenth section of the act entitled, "An act authorizing the governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road from the river Schuylkill at Reading, in the county of Berks, to or near Hummelstown, in the county of Dauphin," passed the second day of March, one thousand eight hundred and five, or may, at their discretion, ask, demand and receive from all and every person or persons using said roads, with a waggon or other carriage drawn by four or more horses, the breadth of the wheels of which shall be less than four inches, for every five miles, one cent additional for each horse drawing the same.

## CHAPTER CXVIII.

An ACT providing for repairing the State House in the city of Philadelphia.

sioners. **SECT. I.** *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same*, That the commissioners of the county of Philadelphia be, and they are hereby authorized and required, to take charge of the State House in the city of Philadelphia, and to let the same, in the name of the commonwealth, on such terms and for such uses as to them may appear advisable, giving a preference of all the upper part of the
