CHAPTER CXXI.

An ACT vesting in the superintendant of police of the district of Southwark, and the superintendant of police of the incorporated district of the Northern Liberties, with powers similar to those granted at present by law to the constables of said districts.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passage of this act, the superintendant of police of the district of Southwark, and the superintendant of police of the incorporated district of the Northern Liberties, shall be, and they are hereby vested with the like powers, and entitled to all the privileges, emoluments and fees to which the constables of said districts are at this time by law entitled.

CHAPTER CXXII.

An ACT establishing an academy in the borough of Huntingdon, in the county of Huntingdon, and one in the town of Montrose, in the county of Susquehanna.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Academy there shall be, and hereby is established in the borough of Hunt-established ingdon, in the county of Huntingdon, an academy for the education of youth in the useful arts, sciences and literature, by the name and style of "The Huntingdon Academy," and there shall Style. be, and hereby is established at the town of Montrose, in the In Montrose, county of Susquehanna, an academy for the education of youth in the useful arts, sciences and literature, by the name and style Style. of "The Susquehanna Academy."

SEOT. II. And he it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That until the first of April, in the year eighteen hundred and seventeen, the trustees of the Huntingdon academy shall consist of the following persons, to wit: Reverend John John-Trustees son, William Steel, Richard Smith, Patrick Gwin, William R. named. Sect. iv. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said trustees of the Huntingdon academy shall hold their first meeting in the borough of Huntingdon, and the said trustees of the Susquehanna academy shall hold their first meeting in the town of Montrose, on the first Monday in May next, and shall meet on the first Monday in May in each succeeding year, any eight of whom for each academy shall constitute a quorum, who shall have the power of transacting the business of the said respective academics, particularly in making and enacting ordinances and by-laws for the government thereof, of electing trustees in the room of those who may be removed by death, resignation or otherwise, electing and appointing masters and tutors for said academy, of agreeing with them for and paying their salaries, and at their pleasure removing the same, of appointing a secretary and other necessary officers, of taking care of the funds, and managing the concerns of the corporations, and determining all matters and things necessary to be determined and transacted by said trustees: Provided, That no ordinance or by-laws shall have any force which shall be contrary

to the constitution or laws of the United States or of those of this state.

Sect. v. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the first election for trustees to said academies shall elections be holden on the first Monday in April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, and on the first Monday of April annually thereafter, and no person or persons shall be entitled to vote at said elections unless he or they shall have previously become a subscriber to the stock or funds of said academies: Provided, That if the annual election shall not Proviso be made on the stated day, it shall and may be lawful on any other day, as soon as may be, to hold and make an election of said trustees in such manner as shall be regulated by the bylaws and ordinances of the said corporations.

SECT. VI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all by-laws, ordinances and proceedings of the cor-Record of porations shall be fairly and regularly entered in a book to be their prokept for that purpose, and no misnomer of the said corporations ceedings shall defeat or annul any gift, grant, devise or bequest to the Misnomer. same: Provided the intent of the parties shall sufficiently appear on the face of the gift, grant, will or other writing whereby Proviso any estate or other interest was intended to pass to either of the said corporations, nor shall any nonuser of the rights, liberties, privileges, jurisdictions and authorities hereby granted to the said corporations, create or in anywise cause a forfeiture

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said trustees, under the penalty of twenty dollars each, to be recovered as debts of that amount are by law recoverable, one half for the use of the informer, and the other half towards defraying the expenses of teaching the poor children in said academies, shall annually exhibit all their books, accounts and vouchers of every kind to the auditors of their respective counties, to be settled, adjusted and published in the same manner as the accounts of the county commissioners are by law di-

rected to be settled, adjusted and published.

CHAPTER CXXIII.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That such parts of the act passed the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eleven, entitled "An act providing for the settlement of certain disputed titles to land north and west of the rivers Ohio and Allegheny and Conewango creek," as have expired, are hereby revived and re-enacted, and all agreements heretofore made, or which hereafter shall be made within two years from the first day of April next, in conformity to the provisions therein contained, for any of the said lands lying north and west of the rivers Ohio and Allegheny and
