

CHAPTER CXVIII.

AN ACT

Granting compensation to Frederick Fœring for services performed as deputy quarter master general of the militia of this Commonwealth.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Legislature, that Frederick Fœring, of the county of Philadelphia, was appointed deputy quarter master general of the militia of this Commonwealth, and rendered services therein: And whereas there is no provision by law to compensate him for services thus rendered:

Therefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the state treasurer be, and he is hereby directed to pay to Frederick Fœring, or his order, five hundred and ten dollars, in full for services performed under the appointment of deputy quarter master general of the militia of this Commonwealth, in the years eighteen hundred thirteen and fourteen.

CHAPTER CXIX.

AN ACT

Releasing to Elizabeth, the wife of Peter Crum, the right of this Commonwealth to a certain escheated estate.

WHEREAS it is represented to the Legislature, that Henry Bach, late of the township of Menallin, in the county of Adams, died intestate, without heirs or any known kindred, being seized in fee of a certain real estate, which is supposed to have escheated to the Commonwealth: And whereas the said Henry left a widow named Elizabeth, who has since intermarried with Peter Crum: Therefore,
