

CHAPTER XIX.

A SUPPLEMENT

To the act, entitled "An act declaring the rivers Codorus and Conewago in the county of York, public highways, and for other purposes therein mentioned."

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, any person or persons who shall draw, set or cast any seine or brush net, or shall be aiding or assisting therein in the waters of the river Codorus in the county of York, below the forks thereof, shall forfeit and pay a fine not less than five nor more than ten dollars for every such offence, on being legally convicted thereof on the testimony of one or more credible witnesses, before any justice of the peace of said county, one moiety thereof to the informer, the other half or moiety to the supervisors of the said river, to be applied by them in clearing out and improving the navigation thereof.

Penalty for drawing, &c. any seine or brush net in the Codorus, or assisting therein.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That so much of the act to which this is a supplement as is hereby altered or supplied, be and the same is hereby repealed.

CHAPTER XX.

AN ACT

To enable the committee of the estate of Joseph Wharton, a lunatic, to sell and convey the real estate of the said Joseph Wharton.

WHEREAS it appears by the proceedings had in the court of common pleas for the county of Philadelphia, that a certain

Joseph Wharton of said county, has been adjudged a lunatic, and that Thomas J. Wharton was by the said court duly appointed a committee of the estate of the said Joseph Wharton. And whereas the said committee has represented to the legislature that the income of his real estate is insufficient to maintain the said Joseph Wharton :

Therefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the real estate of the said Joseph Wharton, lying in this commonwealth, be, and it is hereby vested in the said Thomas J. Wharton in trust, to receive the rents, issues and profits thereof, and to appropriate the same to the maintenance of the said Joseph Wharton during the continuance of his mental infirmity, with power to sell or otherwise dispose of such parts thereof as he may deem expedient for the benefit of the said Joseph Wharton, and good and sufficient assurances in law to make to any purchaser or purchasers: *Provided,* That the said Thomas J. Wharton shall before he proceeds to sell and convey any part of the said real estate, enter into a recognizance with sufficient security in the court of common pleas for the county of Philadelphia, for the faithful discharge of the trust reposed in him by this act, and that he the said Thomas J. Wharton, his executors or administrators, shall render a true account to the said Joseph Wharton in case he shall be restored to his reason, or to his legal representatives, in case of his death without a restoration of reason, of the appropriation arising from the sale of any part of the said real estate, and pay over to him or them such surplus as may be in his hands, and also be subject further to account as a committee in the same manner as if this act had not been passed.

Real estate vested.

Power to sell.

Proviso,

He shall give security, and render a true account.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said Thomas J. Wharton or his heirs, shall by a legal deed convey to the said Joseph Wharton, in case he shall be restored to his reason, or to his legal representatives in case of his death, the real estate before mentioned, remaining unsold.
