CHAPTER XLIV.

*AN ACT*

Granting a sum of money to the county of York, for the purposes therein mentioned.

WHEREAS it appears that an inundation awful and distressing in its consequences was lately experienced in the county of York, that in addition to great private calamities it has been attended with heavy losses of a public nature, and application has been made to the legislature for relief.

Wherefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the State Treasurer be, and is hereby directed to pay unto the commissioners of the county of York the sum of five thousand dollars, to be applied by them in rebuilding and repairing public bridges in said county which were destroyed or injured by the late inundation, to be accounted for by them in the usual manner; and the said commissioners are hereby required to give bond with sufficient security to the Governor for the faithful application of the said sum according to the intent and meaning hereof.*

The State Treasurer to pay \$ 5,000 to the commissioners of York county.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the State Treasurer is hereby directed to pay un- State Treas-

## CHAPTER XLV.

### *A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT*

To the act, entitled “An act to enable the Governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road beginning at the west end of the Lancaster and Middletown turnpike road at or near Middletown, from thence to the line of William Maclay’s land in Dauphin county.”

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That in addition to the tolls authorised to be taken on the Middletown and Harrisburg turnpike road, it shall be lawful for the president, managers and company thereof to take and receive the following, that is to say, For every space of five miles in length of the said road the following sums of money, and in like proportion for every greater or less distance, or for any greater or less number of hogs, sheep or cattle in proportion, viz. For every score of sheep three cents, for every score of hogs six and one-fourth cents, and for every score of cattle twelve and a half cents.
