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CHAPTER LXVI.

*A SUPPLEMENT*

To the act, entitled “An act to enable the Governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road, beginning at the west end of the Lancaster, Elizabethtown and Middletown turnpike road, at or near Middletown; from thence to the line of William Maclay’s land, adjoining the upper boundary of the borough of Harrisburg, in Dauphin county.”

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the president, managers and company, incorporated by the act to which this is a supplement, may and they are hereby authorised, forthwith to increase or diminish the rates of toll made payable by their act of incorporation, in the like manner and under the like restrictions as are provided by the act, entitled “An act to enable the Governor of this commonwealth to incorporate a company for making an artificial road from Lancaster, through Elizabethtown to Middletown,” passed the fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and four, in proportion to the distance travelled on their road, and to receive and collect such tolls in the manner directed by their act of incorporation: *Provided,* That <sup>Proviso.</sup> nothing herein contained, shall be of any force or effect, until the stockholders in a general meeting, shall have agreed to conform to such regulations as any future legislature may enact; wholly exempting from or diminishing the toll on wagons, whose wheels shall not be less than nine inches and roll not less than twelve inches in width, and filed in the office of the

Secretary of this Commonwealth, a by-law or resolution to that effect, duly authenticated.

CHAPTER LXVII.

*AN ACT*

To annul the marriage of Jacob Foltz and Polly his wife.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to the legislature that Jacob Foltz, of Union county, intermarried with a certain Polly Swineford, of the same county, with whom he lived and cohabited for a number of years, during which time they had several children, and that the said Jacob, regardless of the laws and his matrimonial vows, and regardless of his duty as a husband, did desert and abandon his wife and children, and has since been convicted of felony in Adams county, and sentenced to hard labor in the penitentiary, but was pardoned by the Governor and has since been convicted of burglary in Cumberland county and sentenced to hard labor in the penitentiary.

Therefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the marriage contract between Jacob Foltz and Polly his wife, be, and the same is hereby declared null and void, and they are hereby set free and discharged from the marriage contract and all the duties arising under the same, as fully and absolutely as if they had never been joined in marriage; but nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to affect or render illegitimate any child or children born of the body of the said Polly during her coverture; and the*
