Oath, &c. to upon the duties of their appointment, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation, before some justice of the peace, faithbe taken. fully and impartially to perform the duties required of them by this act. And they shall each receive three dollars per day for every day necessarily employed in the service re-Compensa. tion. quired by this act, together with reasonable allowance for expenses in employing markers and chain carriers; and to be paid on orders drawn by the commissioners of the counties through which the road may pass, on the treasurers thereof respectively, according to the distance through the respective Governor to counties. And in case either of the said commissioners shall supplyvacan- die, neglect, or refuse to perform the duties hereby required, the Governor is hereby authorised to supply the vacancy by a new appointment.

CHAPTER LXIX.

AN ACT

Relative to the claim of the commonwealth against Peter Baynton, and against the estate of John Nicholson, deceased.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the Attorney General, with the advice and consent of the officers of the accountant department, be authori-Attorney prosecute the sed and required to prosecute the claim of the commonclaim against wealth against Peter Baynton, formerly State Treasurer, in such manner as may be deemed best calculated to recover Peter Baynthe amount due. That he be further authorised as aforesaid, Whenhemay upon the payment or securing the payment of the debt and interest due the commonwealth, to release the lien of the release the commonwealth upon the lands of the said Peter Baynton, eilièn. ther to himself or his creditors, as the case may require; or if it shall be necessary to have the lands sold for the payment of said sum, that the Attorney General be authorised to give time for the payment of the whole, or such parts of

the purchase money as may be thought expedient.

Sect. 2. Sect. 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the Auditor General, Secretary of the Land Of-Powers of office and Attorney General, be, and they hereby are invested ficers to adwith full power and authority, to adjust, prosecute and reclaims of the cover, or compromise the claims of the commonwealth, against commonthe estate of the late John Nicholson, formerly Comptroller wealth. General, and one or more suitable agent or agents for that purpose to appoint: Provided, Any compensation to be al- Proviso.

lowed to such agent, and all other expenses under this section of the act, shall wholly depend on and be paid out of the proceeds to be recovered; and that no compromise or allowance of any kind, shall be made exceeding in the whole one-fourth part of the property that may be recovered or the

proceeds thereof.

Sect. 4. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the sum of five hundred dollars be appropriated rive numer dollars apto carry into effect the provisions of the first and second sec-propriated. tions of this act, to be paid on a warrant or warrants, drawn by the Auditor General on the State Treasurer: Provided, Proviso. That a bill of the particulars to which the money is to be applied, be first examined and approved by the officers of the accountant department.
