

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the high constable shall give bond, with security to the town council, in such sum as a majority of them shall deem necessary, conditioned for the faithful performance of all and singular, the duties enjoined upon him by the original act aforesaid, or by the by-laws of the corporation. And the treasurer appointed agreeably to the said act, shall also give such security, for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office, as the majority of the town council shall deem necessary. And if the high constable, treasurer, town clerk, or any officer appointed by the corporation, in pursuance of the act or by-laws aforesaid, shall make default, or neglect to perform the duties enjoined upon him or them, on complaint thereof being made to the burgess, by the majority of the town council, the burgess is hereby authorised to remove all or any of them from office. And he and the town council shall appoint others in their room and stead, to supply the vacancy or vacancies; and after such appointment and acceptance thereof, by the person so appointed, take security in manner aforesaid.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the fifth section and the last proviso of the sixth section of the original act, and so much of the said act as is hereby altered or supplied, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

CHAPTER LXXXVI.

AN ACT

Relating to the Arsenal at Meadville.

SEC. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the department of accounts, be, and they hereby

are authorised and required to settle and adjust the accounts of William Clark, for digging a well at the arsenal at Meadville, and for other expenses relative to the said arsenal; the amount to be paid by the State Treasurer, on a warrant drawn in the usual manner, not to exceed the sum of eighty-three dollars and thirty-seven cents.

Accounts of William Clark to be settled and paid.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid* That the superintendent of the arsenal at Meadville, be, and he is hereby authorised to cause the ground around and in front of the building to be levelled, in such manner as he may deem necessary, and settle his accounts for the same in the usual manner, with the accountant department, for which purpose a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars is hereby appropriated.

CHAPTER LXXXVII.

AN ACT

Granting an annuity to Hugh Campbell, a soldier of the revolutionary war.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the State Treasurer be, and he hereby is directed to pay to Hugh Campbell, of Chester county, or his order, forty dollars immediately after the passing of this act, and an annuity of forty dollars, to be paid half yearly, commencing on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen.
