

CHAPTER XIII.

*AN ACT*

Authorizing the transmission of the Laws of this Commonwealth to the Government of the United States.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the Secretary of the Commonwealth be, and he is hereby authorised to transmit to the Secretary of State of the United States, five complete sets of Smith's edition of the laws of this Commonwealth, five copies of Purdon's Digest, and five copies of the Pamphlet Laws of this state of each session, since the session of one thousand eight hundred and eleven, twelve, until the present time, to be distributed as follows, one copy thereof to the president of the United States, one copy to the Secretary of State for the use of their offices respectively, one copy to each of the houses of congress and one copy for the use of the library thereof.

Five sets of Smith and a like number of Purdon to be transmitted to Secretary of State.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the Secretary of the Commonwealth be, and he is hereby authorised and required to transmit to the same department of the United States, five copies of the laws passed during the present session of the Legislature, and annually hereafter five copies of all laws that may be passed at every subsequent session thereof, to be applied as is directed by the first section of this act.

Five copies of laws hereafter passed to be sent in like manner.

CHAPTER XIV.

*AN ACT*

To extend and continue for a limited time the act, entitled "An act to enable the Governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road from Jersey shore, in the county of Lycoming, to Coudersport, in the county of Potter."

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General*

*Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the act, entitled "An act to enable the Governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road from Jersey shore, in the county of Lycoming, to Coudersport, in the county of Potter," passed the twentieth of February, eighteen hundred and sixteen, be and the same is hereby extended and continued for four years, from and after the twentieth day of February next.*

## CHAPTER XV.

### *AN ACT*

To enable George Murray, Gideon Fairman, John Draper, Robert Bald and Thomas Underwood, co-partners, in the firm of Murray, Fairman and company, engravers, of the city of Philadelphia, to dispose of certain books, maps, plates and prints by way of lottery.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Andrew Bayard, Mathew Carey, Samuel Mifflin, Clement C. Biddle, Andrew Petitt, Adam Eckfelt, Andrew M. Prevost, or a majority of them, be and they are hereby appointed commissioners to superintend the distribution of the property as set forth in the following scheme of a lottery, for promoting the sciences and useful arts.*

Two hundred prizes, each consisting of one complete set Scheme of of the American edition of Dr. Rees's new Cyclopædia, com-lottery. prising at least eighty-two numbers, subscription price four dollars per number, amounting to three hundred and twenty-eight dollars—sixty-five thousand dollars.

One hundred prizes, each consisting of a complete set of the same work elegantly bound, at four hundred dollars each set—forty thousand dollars.

Two hundred and fifty prizes, each consisting of an imperfect set, containing at the least thirty numbers, at two dollars
