That it shall 2d proviso. and may be lawful for the owners of the said lands, to use the said drain as a general receiver, into which to conduct the water off their land, they paying a proportionate part of the expense of keeping the same in repair: Provided how-ever, That nothing herein contained shall prevent any person 3d proviso. injured by any thing done by virtue of this act, from recovering damages to the amount of such injury, which shall be ascertained by three disinterested persons, to be appointed by the court of common pleas, on application of the party injured, whose report shall have the same effect as the report of referees under the act of seventeen hundred and five.
