CHAPTER CXLIX.

A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the several qualified electors who shall vote at How qualifiany general or special election within this commonwealth, ed electors shall give in to the inspectors of such election separate tickets shall vote. for each station or office voted for, which tickets shall contain no more than the proper number of names; but no ticket shall be rejected by the judges of the election in counting off the votes, should the same contain fewer names than the proper number, those for sheriffs and coroners excepted.

SECT. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That from and after the passage of this act, any of the judges of any general, special, township and ward election Judges may are hereby authorised to administer oaths or affirmations to oaths or affirmations to oaths or affirmations. persons who may offer to vote at such election, for the pur-mations. pose of ascertaining whether such person is entitled to vote at such election, agreeably to the laws regulating the general elections within this commonwealth; and if any person swears or affirms falsely, or suborns any other person or per-penalty for sons to swear or affirm falsely, he or they shall be subject to swearing the same penalties and disabilities as if such oath or affirma-falsely. tion had been administered by a judge of the court or a justice. of the peace.

officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary departments of the United States, and also that every member of congress is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this state.

Authorising a review of parts of a state road in Fayette and Greene counties.

SECT. 1.
