AN ACT

For the relief of Mary Campbell, the widow of a revolutionary soldier.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby authorised and required to pay to Mary Campbell, of the city of Philadelphia, widow of a soldier of the revolution, or to her order, forty dollars immediately, and an annuity of forty dollars during life, payable half yearly, to commence on the first of January, eighteen hundred and thirty-two.

AN ACT

Vacating and laying aside "Blackberry alley," in the city of Philadelphia.

Preamble.

WHEREAS a certain alley called "Blackberry alley," laid out and declared a public highway, by several acts of assembly has become useless to the public and inconvenient and burdensome to the owners of the ground bordering thereon, and bounded thereby: Therefore,

Court to appoint viewers.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the court of Quarter Sessions of the county of Philadelphia be and they are hereby authorized, upon the application of the owners of the adjacent ground, to appoint a jury of view, according to the laws of this commonwealth, in relation to the streets, lanes and alleys within the city of Philadelphia, for the purpose of ascertaining and determining whether an alley called Blackberry alley, running from Pine to Lombard street, between Eighth and Ninth streets, from the Delaware, has become useless and inconvenient to

the public, and if the jury aforesaid shall be of opinion and report that the said alley ought to be closed and vacated, and the said report shall be confirmed by the said court, in the usual manner, then and from that time the said alley shall be vacated and laid aside *forever*, as if the same had never been opened, and all right therein and thereto shall be vested in the owners of the adjoining lots.

AN ACT

Authorizing the burgesses and assistant burgesses of the borough of Frankford in the county of Philadelphia to appoint a corder of wood.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the burgesses and assistants of the borough of Frankford shall on the first Monday of April next, and annually thereafter, appoint a suitable person as corder and inspector of cord wood that may be brought for sale within said borough and its landings, and shall be governed by the same rules and regulations as corders in the city and county of Philadelphia now by law are governed.
