SECT. 36. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the Governor be and he is hereby authorized and required to subscribe ninety-two shares of twenty five dollars each, to the stock of the company, for erecting a bridge over the west branch of the river Susquehanna, at the borough of Milton, one half of the amount of said subscription to be paid as soon as the abutments and piers shall have been erected, and the remainder thereof when the said bridge shall be finished, on warrants drawn by the Governor on the State Treasurer. AN ACT

For the relief of sundry soldiers and widows of soldiers of the revolutionary war.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to pay to James Ewing, of Chester

SECT. 8. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby required to pay to John Ewing, of Huntingdon county, a soldier of the revolution, or to his order, forty dollars as a gratuity for his revolutionary services, and that so much of the act passed the twenty-fourth day of March, eighteen hundred and thirty-two, entitled "An act for the relief of James Ewing, James Seals and Thomas Abbott, soldiers of the revolutionary war," as grants a gratuity to James Ewing of Huntingdon county, be and the same is hereby repealed. A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT
