To incorporate the "Philadelphia Typographical Society."

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That James Russell, A. W. Benedict, John P. Colcord, John Boyle, J. J. Haswell, Nicholas Spencer, Fayette Pierson, John Notson, John R. Wallace, William Corse, William Wellington, Alexander Knox, David Bartram, George D. Haswell, John W. Gibbs, Robert W. Barnard, E. Barrington, Benjamin Mifflin, and others, that are now or may hereafter be connected with them, be and they are hereby incorporated under the name, style and title of the "Philadelphia Typographical society," the officers of which to consist of a president, vice president, treasurer, secretary and assistant secretary, who shall be elected annually on the first Saturday in January, and serve for the term of one year; three stewards, one of whom shall be elected monthly and serve for the term of three months, and a committee of inquiry to be appointed monthly.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That candidates for membership, shall be printers of good moral character, capable of pursuing their occupation, and of an age not exceeding forty five and not less than twenty-one years, whose election or expulsion shall require the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present at a stated meeting; they shall not be entitled to the privileges and benefits of membership, until they shall have signed the constitution and been a member six months; each member shall pay into the treasury such initiation fee as is prescribed in the by-laws, and the sum of fifty cents per month; and in case of sickness or accident, shall receive the sum of five dollars per week; and in the event of his decease, the sum of forty dollars shall be awarded to his wife, nearest relation or friend.

SECT. 3. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That should a member feign himself sick, or otherwise indisposed, for the purpose of deriving benefit from the said society, or whose conduct shall in any wise be disgraceful to himself or derogatory to its respectability, such member shall, on due proof of either of the above charges, be expelled and forfeit all interest in the property or funds: *Provided,* That no such member shall be expelled until notice of the charge be given him, and an opportunity of defending himself is afforded.

SECT. 4. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said society may receive any sum of money or any property whatever, that may or shall hereafter be devised or bequeathed unto it by any person or persons capable of making such devise or bequest, to be disposed of according to its laws: *Provided,* That the clear yearly value or income of the messuages, houses, tenements, rents, annuities, or other hereditaments and real estate, and the interest of the money by it lent, shall not exceed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, Pennsylvania currency.

Style. Dissolution, &c.

SECT. 5. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That all deeds, assignments or other instruments of writing for the use of the said society, shall be drawn in the name of the "Philadelphia Typographical society," and that the said society shall not be dissolved while there are ten members willing to continue it.

Of the by-laws.

SECT. 6. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the members of the said society be empowered to enact by-laws and resolutions for the government of the same: *Provided,* That such by-laws and resolutions be not repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States or to the constitution and laws of this state or to this act.

AN ACT

Relating to Edgmont Road.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to the legislature that a certain great road, leading from Chester, in the county of Delaware, through said county, known by the name of the Edgmont great road, was laid out well nigh a century ago, of forty-five feet in width, but that circumstances, (unavoidable in their nature of latter times,) have for many years confirmed most if not all the landholders along said road in the belief that its legal width was thirty-five or forty feet, and
