

Society authorized to receive bequests.
Proviso. Income limited.

SECT. 4. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said society may receive any sum of money or any property whatever, that may or shall hereafter be devised or bequeathed unto it by any person or persons capable of making such devise or bequest, to be disposed of according to its laws: *Provided,* That the clear yearly value or income of the messuages, houses, tenements, rents, annuities, or other hereditaments and real estate, and the interest of the money by it lent, shall not exceed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, Pennsylvania currency.

Style. Dissolution, &c.

SECT. 5. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That all deeds, assignments or other instruments of writing for the use of the said society, shall be drawn in the name of the "Philadelphia Typographical society," and that the said society shall not be dissolved while there are ten members willing to continue it.

Of the by-laws.

SECT. 6. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the members of the said society be empowered to enact by-laws and resolutions for the government of the same: *Provided,* That such by-laws and resolutions be not repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States or to the constitution and laws of this state or to this act.

AN ACT

Relating to Edgmont Road.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to the legislature that a certain great road, leading from Chester, in the county of Delaware, through said county, known by the name of the Edgmont great road, was laid out well nigh a century ago, of forty-five feet in width, but that circumstances, (unavoidable in their nature of latter times.) have for many years confirmed most if not all the landholders along said road in the belief that its legal width was thirty-five or forty feet, and

they have accordingly adjusted their hedges, fences, and in many instances their buildings, to one or other of the latter widths; that there are many facts which go to show that the track of said road, as used from time immemorial, is not on and in many parts thereof, not very near its original location, but that nearly all the old marks by which its courses were originally run are obliterated, and that difficulties growing out of these circumstances have thrown insuperable obstacles in the way of supervisors in the performance of their legal duties, and that the court of Quarter Sessions entertain doubts of their jurisdiction extending to such a case under the general road law: Therefore,

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That all the provisions of the general road law and of the supplements thereto, in regard to laying out and vacating public roads, are hereby extended to the case of the Edgmont road above recited, and the court of Quarter Sessions of Delaware county, upon the petition of twenty or more citizens of said county, shall proceed to appoint viewers, and if requisite, reviewers and re-reviewers for the purpose of vacating said road, and laying out a new one suitable to the accommodation of the public: *Provided,* That notice of the time of meeting of the viewers shall be published two successive weeks in the newspapers of the county.
