AN ACT

For the relief of Joseph Adams and Andrew Freaker.

WHEREAS, Joseph Adams and Andrew Freaker, late supervisors of Porter township, in Huntingdon county, became liable, in their individual capacities, for money expended in opening and making a road across Tussey mountain in said county: *And whereas*, a judgment has been obtained against them, in the court of Common Pleas of said county, in favor of the administrators of John Thompson, late of said county, deceased, for the sum of four hundred and sixty-eight dollars, with interest and costs of suit, for remedy whereof,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same*, That the supervisors of Walker and Porter townships, and the street commissioners of the borough of Alexandria, in the county of Huntingdon, be and they are hereby authorized and required to levy upon, assess and collect, from the taxable inhabitants of said townships of Walker and Porter and borough of Alexandria, the sum of four hundred and sixty-eight dollars, with interest and costs, in the manner that county rates and levies are raised in the several counties in this commonwealth, which sum, when so collected, the said supervisors are hereby authorized and required to pay the same to Joseph Adams and Andrew Freaker, late supervisors of Porter township, in said county of Huntingdon, and the said supervisors shall be entitled to the rates of compensation as is usually allowed for similar services, to be settled in the like manner, and at the same time that their accounts are settled by the auditors of the said townships and borough respectively.
