AN ACT

Regulating Election Districts.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the electors in that part of Wayne township, in the county of Lycoming, lying east of a small creek which empties into the West Branch of the river Susquehanna, nearly opposite the mouth of Pine creek, shall hereafter hold their general elections in the borough of Jersey shore, and vote in the same box with that part of Neppenose township, who vote in said borough. Wayne township, Lyco'g co.

SECTION 2. The general elections of the township of Corydon, in the county of M'Kean, shall hereafter, be held at the M'Kean co. school house in the village of Corydon, in said township.

SECTION 3. The electors of Ohio township, in the county of Ohio, Beaver, shall hold their annual and special elections alternately at the house now occupied by Abraham Cole, in the village of Fairview, and at the house lately occupied by Macall Dawson, deceased, in the village of Ohioville, the first election to be held at the former place. Beaver co.

SECTION 4. The electors of Concord township, in the county of Erie, shall hereafter hold their general elections at a school house near the residence of James M'Cray, at whose house in said township the elections are now held. Concord, Erie co.

SECTION 5. The township of Davidson, in the county of Lycoming, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and shall hold their general elections hereafter at the house of Joseph Converse, junior, in said township. Davidson, Lycom'g co.

SECTION 6. The electors of the township of Rome, in the county of Crawford, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school house in the village of Centreville. Rome, Crawford co.

SECTION 7. The electors of that part of Allen township, in the county of Cumberland, who have heretofore held their elections at the house of Jacob Gher, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of David Shaeffer, in said township. Allen, Cumberland co.

SECTION 8. The electors of the township of Providence, in the county of Luzerne, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by James H. Phinny, in said township. Providence, Luzerne co.

SECTION 9. The electors residing within that part of Heidelberg township, in the county of Berks, who have heretofore voted in the borough of Reading, shall hereafter hold their Heidelberg, Berks co.

SECTION 10. The electors of Hamilton township, Adams county, composing the sixth election district, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of Philip Eich, in the town of Berlin.

SECTION 12. The general elections in the township of Bristol in the county of Bucks, shall from and after the passage of this act, be held at the public house in the village of Newport, in said township, now or lately occupied by William W. Sisom.

SECTION 13. The electors of the township of Fannet, in the county of Franklin, who have heretofore held their general election at the school house on the lands of the heirs of ——— Holliday and ——— Wallace, deceased, shall hereafter hold them at the school house on the land of James Doyle, in the said township.

SECTION 14. The electors of the township of Freehold, in the county of Warren, shall hold their general elections at the house of Hewlett Leatt, in the said township.

SECTION 15. The electors of Pine Grove township, in Venango county, shall hold their general elections at the house of Christian Hehnlen, in said township, being the same place that they have heretofore been held.

SECTION 16. The electors of the township of Sugargrove, in the county of Warren, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school house, in the village of Sugargrove, in said township.

SECTION 17. The citizens of Canal township, in the county of Venango, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of Joseph A. Gilleland, in said township.

SECTION 18. The township of West Whiteland, in the county of Chester, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the house of George Boyers, near the intersection of the West Chester and Red Lion road with the Pennsylvania rail way, in said township.

SECTION 19. The electors of Farmington township, in the county of Tioga, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Jacob Lichtenthaler, in said township.

SECTION 20. The electors of Shippen township, in the county of Tioga, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by John Mathers, in said township.

SECTION 21. The township of Hector, in the county of Potter, is hereby erected into a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hereafter hold their general elections

at the house now occupied by B. G. Chamberlin in said township.

SECTION 22. That part of Wysox township, in the county of Bradford, and which lately formed a part of Monroe township, in said county, shall hereafter be attached to the Wysox election district, for general election purposes. Wysox,

SECTION 23. The electors of the township and borough of Athens, in the county of Bradford, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Guy Tozer, in said borough. Athens,

SECTION 24. The electors of the township of Armstrong, in the county of Indiana, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Reuben Jewell, in said township. Armstrong,

SECTION 25. That part of Green township, in the county of Indiana, south and west of a line, commencing at the line of Washington township, opposite the house of David Ralston, thence by a direct line to the house of Abraham Lydick, thence by the road leading from said Lydick's, to the line of Centre township, near the house of Thomas Rees, is hereby annexed to the election district in said county by law directed to hold their general elections at the court house in the borough of Indiana, and the electors thereof shall hereafter hold their general elections and vote with the electors of said district at said court house. SECTION 26. That part of Wheatfield township, in the county of Indiana, lying north of Blacklick creek, shall be a separate election district, and the electors residing therein, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school house in Mechanicsburg in said township. Wheatfield,

SECTION 27. The electors of the township of Rose, in Jefferson county, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the court house in the town of Brookville, in said county. Rose,

SECTION 28. The general elections for the township of Nottingham, in the county of Washington, shall hereafter be held at the house of Frederick Cooper, in said township. Nottingham,

SECTION 29. The electors of Washington township, in the county of Union, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied and kept as a public house by George Strayer, in the town of Freeburg, in said township. Washington,

SECTION 30. The electors of Lackawaxen township, in the county of Pike, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by John Westfal, in said township. Lackawaxen,

SECTION 31. The sixtieth section of the act entitled "An act regulating election districts," passed the ninth day of April, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three, be and the same is hereby repealed. Part of cer-

SECTION 32. The township of West Earl, in the county of Lancaster, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors residing in said township, shall hold their general West Earl,

SECTION 33. From and after the passage of this act, the township of Rush, in the county of Dauphin, shall be a separate election district, and the election in said district shall be held at the house lately occupied by Jacob Shiley, in said township.

SECTION 34. From and after the passage of this act, so much of the township of Wayne, in the county of Mifflin, as by an existing law is erected into a separate election district for the election of sheriff and other county officers, is hereby erected into a separate election district for the election of constable and other township officers, and the electors residing within the said district are hereby authorized to hold their election for constable and all other township officers at the same house in the village of Newton-Hamilton, where they now hold their general elections; and it shall be the duty of one of the supervisors of said township of Wayne to superintend the said election at the said village of Newton-Hamilton, in the same manner as constables are by the existing laws of this Commonwealth bound to do; and after every such township election it shall be the duty of said supervisor and the constable for said township to meet at Waynesburg, in said township, and cast up the votes given by the said township officers and serve notice on those who shall have been elected, and make out a return, which they shall forward to the clerk of the court of Quarter Sessions of the county of Mifflin.

SECTION 35. It shall be lawful for a majority of the qualified electors in each and every ward of the district of Spring Garden, in the county of Philadelphia, to change the place of holding their ward elections to such place as may be most convenient for them, in the same manner and under the same regulations as by law is now provided for changing the places of holding ward elections in the city of Philadelphia.

SECTION 36. So much of the Kensington district as is bounded on the west by the easterly line of Front street, on the north by Prince street, on the east by Shackamaxon street, on the south by the river Delaware, and on the west by Cohocksink creek, shall be one ward, to be called the first ward; and so much of said district as is bounded by Canal street on the south and west, by Franklin street on the north, by Front street on the east, shall be one ward, to be called the second ward; and so much of said district as is bounded partly by Canal street and partly by Sixth street on the west, by Montgomery street on the north, by Front street on the east, and by Franklin street on the south, shall be one ward, to be called the third ward; and so much of the said district as is bounded by Hanover street on the east from the river Delaware to the Frankford road, from the Frankford road to Front street on the north, by Montgomery street on the west, by Front street on the south, by

Prince street, and by the easterly line of Shackamaxon street from Prince street to the river Delaware, shall be one ward, to be called fourth ward; and so much of the said district as lies between the northern and western boundary thereof, the river Delaware and the boundaries described to the third and fourth wards, shall be one ward, to be called the fifth ward.

SECTION 37. The electors of the said Kensington district of the Northern Liberties shall meet within the bounds of the several wards of said district, on Friday next preceding the first Tuesday in October in each year, and at such places as may be designated by them, of which ten days public notice shall be given in handbills posted up in at least ten of the most public places within the respective wards, and then and there to elect two inspectors of the general election and one assessor, for each ward, said election to be conducted in all respects as is provided for by the existing laws of this Commonwealth.

SECTION 38. The electors of the said district, on the last Monday in March next, and on that day every year thereafter, shall proceed to elect two reputable citizens of said district, residing within the bounds of each ward, for the office of constable of said district, and make return of said election to the next court of Quarter Sessions for the said county, and the said court shall appoint one of the two persons so elected in each of said wards, to be constable for the same, and the said five constables so elected and appointed, shall have the like power and authority and be subject to the same regulations and penalties as are provided and contained in the several laws and enactments respecting constables as now exist or hereafter may be enacted within this Commonwealth, notice of said election to be given by the constables in the same manner as is now directed and provided for by law.

SECTION 39. The general and presidential elections shall be held at the Commissioners' Hall in said district, and the said commissioners shall open five windows and afford all suitable conveniences to the electors of the different wards to give their votes.

SECTION 40. The inspectors for the different wards chosen as aforesaid, shall meet at eight o'clock in the forenoon of the day of election, at the place appointed for holding the same for the district of Kensington, and shall then and there choose five respectable citizens, qualified to vote, who shall be judges of the election in said district, and the five judges so chosen by the inspectors of the five wards, shall perform all the duties enjoined by law upon the judges of the general election for said district.

SECTION 41. The electors of the townships of Upper Salford and Marlborough, in the county of Montgomery, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by John Hartrauft, in the village of Sunneystown, in the township of Marlborough aforesaid.

Franconia & Lower Salford Montgomery co. **SECTION 42.** The electors of the townships of Franconia and Lower Salford, in the county of Montgomery, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Abraham Harley, in the township of Lower Salford aforesaid.

Cærnarven; Berks co. **SECTION 43.** The electors of Cærnarven township, in the county of Berks, shall hereafter hold their general election at the house of David Morgan, in the village of Morgantown, in said township.

Union, Berks co. **SECTION 44.** All that part of Union township, in the county of Berks, now voting in Robison township, is re-annexed to Union township.

Summerhill, Cambria co. **SECTION 45.** The electors of Summerhill township, in the county of Cambria, shall hold their annual and special elections at the house now occupied by Michael Benson, in the town of Jefferson, in said township.

South and North wards in Harrisb'g, Dauphin co. number of assessors. **SECTION 46.** The electors of south ward and north ward in the borough of Harrisburg, in the county of Dauphin, shall each annually elect in each of the said wards respectively, the same number of assessors that a ward, township or district is by law entitled to elect, and that the elections for said assessors shall be held at the same time and places that the elections for inspectors of the general elections are held for each of the said wards respectively.

Monaghan, York co. **SECTION 47.** The electors of the township of Monaghan, in the county of York, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by James Kerr, in said township.

Cornplanter, Venango co. Q. S. to fix place. **SECTION 48.** The Court of Quarter Sessions of the county of Venango, are hereby authorized to fix the place of holding the general election for the township of Cornplanter in said county, at such place as they may think most expedient.

Conewango, Warren co. **SECTION 49.** The citizens of the township of Conewango in the county of Warren, shall hereafter hold their general elections in the East wing of the court house, in the borough of Warren.

Columbus, Warren co. **SECTION 50.** The electors of the township of Columbus in the county of Warren, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school-house in the village of Columbus.

Lackawannock and Neshanock, Mercer co. **SECTION 51.** The citizens of Lackawannock and Neshanock townships who have heretofore voted at Hunter's and M'Nair's for township officers, shall hereafter with that part of Mahoning township in Mercer county, which lies east of Shenango creek, hold their elections at the school house in New Wilmington.

Lackawannock, Mercer co. **SECTION 52.** The citizens of Lackawannock township in Mercer county, who have heretofore held their general elections in the borough of Mercer, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the house of James Beyers in said township, and the electors of Shenango township shall hold their general election at the house of Thomas Mitcheltree in the county of Mercer.

SECTION 53. The electors of Derry township in the county Derry, West-
of Westmoreland, shall hereafter hold their general elections at moreland co.
the house of Robert Doty near Salem meeting house in said
township.

SECTION 54. The electors of that part of Washington town-
ship in the county of Westmoreland, that reside between the Washington,
Beaver run, and the Loyalhanna township line, and north of a Westm'd co.
road leading from the Conemaugh river near Saltsburg, and
crossing the Beaver run at the farm of Adam Bowman and
now in the possession of Abraham Evans, shall hereafter hold
their general elections and election for inspectors at the house
of Johnston Duffield, and now in the possession of Conrad
Henry in said township.

SECTION 55. The Western part of Hempfield township in
the county of Westmoreland, included in the following bound-
aries, shall hereafter form a separate election district, to wit: Hempfield,
Beginning where the township line crosses Big Sewickly creek Westm'd co.
near Beck's salt works, and running up said creek to the mouth
of a run near the house of William Clendenin from thence up
said run to the head, from thence in a direct line to the house
of David Miller, from thence by a direct line to the Robbstown
and Greensburg road at the east end of Philip Fox's farm, from
thence along said road to the north end of Henry Steners farm,
from thence in a direct line to a fording on Sewickly creek
near the house of Henry Miller, from thence in a direct line to
the Greensburg and Pittsburg turnpike road at the mouth of a
lane between the houses of Mrs. Singer's and Jacob Smeller's,
from thence to Jacob Heasley's saw mill, from thence in a di-
rect line to the house of James M'Manigle, and from thence in
a direct line to the township line between the farms of William
Moore and Christian Kepple, from thence along said township
line to the place of beginning; and the electors thereof, shall
hereafter hold their general election in the brick school house,
in the town of Adamsburg, and to be called the Adamsburg
district.

SECTION 56. The electors of the fifteenth election district, Henderson,
composed of part of the township of Henderson in the county Huntingdon
of Huntingdon, shall hereafter hold their general elections at co.
the public school house in the village of Roxbury.

SECTION 57. Any law or part of a law, which is by this act Repeal.
altered or supplied, shall be so far and no further repealed.
