An Act

Establishing and altering certain election districts, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, the borough of Easton, in the county of Northampton, shall for the purposes of voting at elections be divided into two wards, as follows, viz: All that part of the said borough lying south of Northampton street, and the road commonly called the Nazareth road, shall constitute one ward, and be called Lehigh ward, and the remainder of the said borough lying north of the said Northampton street and Nazareth road, shall constitute another ward and be called Bushkill ward. Borough of Easton divided in two wards.

SECTION 2. At all general and special elections within the said borough, separate ballot boxes shall be provided for the separate reception of the votes of each ward, and every voter shall vote only at the particular ballot box or boxes of the ward within which he resides. Special elections.

SECTION 3. And the electors of the aforesaid ward shall, under the regulations that are or may be prescribed by the general laws of this Commonwealth in relation thereto, choose one inspector for each of the said wards. Electors to choose one inspector for each ward.

SECTION 4. And the said inspectors shall meet at eight o'clock in the morning of the day appointed for holding the election at the court house in said borough, and shall then and there in conjunction with the other inspectors of the district choose five qualified voters, one from each township and ward, who shall act as judges of the said election, who shall perform all the When inspectors shall meet.

duties enjoined by law upon judges of the general elections within this Commonwealth, and the clerks shall be chosen as heretofore provided by law.

Of constables elected in said borough. SECTION 5. The constables required by law to be elected in the said borough shall be elected by ballot, by the voters qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, on the Friday immediately preceding the third Saturday in March of each and every year, at the place where the general elections are held within the said borough.

Duties of constables. SECTION 6. And it shall be the duty of the constables then in office, ten days previous to the said election to cause written or printed notices of the time and place of holding the same, to be put up in ten of the most public places within the said borough.

Election, how conducted. SECTION 7. And the said election shall be opened, held, conducted and the returns thereof made as is or may be directed by the general laws of this Commonwealth.

Election of overseers. SECTION 8. And at the time and place appointed for holding the elections for constables in the said borough, there shall also be annually elected two qualified voters of the said borough to serve as overseers of the poor of said borough, for the ensuing year or until superseded by successors in office duly elected according to law, and notice of the said election shall be given in the same manner as directed by section six of this act; and the judges and clerks appointed to superintend and conduct the election for constables shall at the same time superintend and conduct the election for overseers of the poor.

Duties of judges. SECTION 9. And it shall be the duty of the judges of said election, within five days thereafter, to make out a certificate of the election of all the township officers and to deliver it to the clerk of the Quarter Sessions, for neglect of which duty the said judges shall forfeit the sum of twenty dollars to be recovered as debts of like amount are by law recoverable, by any person who will sue for the same, one half to the informer and one half to the use of the poor of said borough.

Penalty on neglect. SECTION 10. And it shall be the duty of the clerk of the court of Quarter Sessions of the said county, within five days after receiving the certificate of the judges, to make out, under his hand and seal of office, two certificates, setting forth the names of the two persons elected overseers, and their election; and to deliver the same to the said two persons, for which he shall receive the sum of fifty cents for each certificate, to be paid by them out of the public funds in their hands.

Duty of Clk. of court of Q. S. SECTION 11. And the said persons so elected overseers shall, within five days after being notified as aforesaid, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation before some justice of the peace of said county: I do swear, (or affirm,) that I will discharge the duties of the office of overseer of the poor of the borough of Easton, with fidelity and impartiality, and according to the best of my knowledge and ability.

Oath of overseers:

SECTION 12. The accounts of the overseers of the poor of the borough of Easton, shall be audited and settled by the three auditors elected according to the provisions of the eleventh section of an act passed the nineteenth day of March, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and entitled An act to alter an act entitled An act for erecting the town of Easton, in the county of Northampton, into a borough, and for other purposes therein mentioned; and the overseers of the poor shall, under penalty of fifty dollars, to be recovered as debts of like amount are by law recoverable, one half to the use of the poor of said borough, and one half to the use of the person who may sue for the same, submit their accounts to the said auditors for settlement, within ten days after each annual election.

SECTION 13. And from and after the passage of this act no other public auditors shall be elected within and for the borough of Easton, except the three above named, who are hereby authorized and required to audit all the account of the officers of the said borough.

SECTION 14. The overseers of the poor of the said borough, elected in pursuance of this act, shall have the same powers, be subject to the same penalties and perform the same duties prescribed by the general laws of this Commonwealth previous to the passage of an act entitled "An act relating to counties and townships and county and township officers," passed the fifteenth day of April, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, except so far as the said powers, penalties and duties are by this act altered or supplied.

SECTION 15. The township of West Nottingham, in the county of Chester, shall hereafter be a separate election district and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the public house now occupied by Joseph Kirk, in said township.

SECTION 16. The electors of North Chenango township, in the county of Crawford; shall hereafter hold their general elections at the Centre school-house, in said township.

SECTION 17. The electors of Gwynedd township, in the county of Montgomery, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by David Acuff, in said township.

SECTION 18. The electors of Clifford township, in the county of Susquehanna, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Benjamin Ayres, in the borough of Dundaff, in said township.

SECTION 19. From and after the passage of this act the township elections, for the township of Lenox, in the county of Susquehanna, shall be held on the same day on which the elections in Harmony township in said county are directed by law to be holden.

- Snyder, Jefferson.** SECTION 28. The township of Snyder, in the county of Jefferson, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the house of John M'Laughlin on the Brockway road, in said township.
- Perry, Jefferson.** SECTION 29. The electors of the township of Perry, in the county of Jefferson, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of William Stunkard, in said township.
- Londonderry, Chester.** SECTION 30. The township of Londonderry, in the county of Chester, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the public house now occupied by Jacob Reese, in said township.
- Howard and Bald Eagle, Centre.** SECTION 31. The electors of the township of Howard, in the county of Centre, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of William Tipton, in said township; and the electors of the township of Bald Eagle, in the county of Centre, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Samuel McKinney, in Mill Hall.
- Jordan, Clearfield.** SECTION 32. The township of Jordan, in the county of Clearfield, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the house now occupied by James McNeal, in said township.
- Beccaria, Clearfield.** SECTION 33. The electors of the township of Beccaria, in the county of Clearfield, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by William W. Feltwell, in said township.

SECTION 34. The electors of that part of Buffalo township, Buffalo, in the county of Armstrong, which is not taken by the election district of the boroughs of Kittanning and Freeport, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by the widow Easley, in said township. Buffalo, Armstrong.

SECTION 35. The electors of Rome township, in the county of Crawford, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Francis McGee, in said township. Rome, Crawford.

SECTION 36. The township of Woodberry, in the county of Bedford, shall from and after the passage of this act, form two separate election districts, the boundaries of which shall be as follows, viz: One district beginning at the centre of Clapper's Gap on the top of Dunning's mountain, thence east by a straight line to Kunkle's gap, in Tussey's mountain, thence by a line along Tussey's mountain, between Woodberry and Hopewell townships, in the said county, to the Huntingdon county line, thence along the same to McKee's gap, thence south along Dunning's mountain, on the line between Woodberry and Greenfield townships to the place of beginning, to be called North Woodberry, and the elections shall be held in the brick house now occupied by Samuel Swoope, in the town of Martinsburg. The other district beginning at a point in the centre of Kunkle's gap, on the summit of Tussey's mountain thence along the township line to the south east corner of Woodberry township, thence along the township line to the southwest corner of said township, thence along the township line, to a point in the centre of Clapper's gap on the top of Dunning's mountain, and thence by a straight line east to the place of beginning, to be called South Woodberry, and the elections in said district shall be held at the house of Martin Loy, in Loysburg. Woodberry, Bedford.

SECTION 37. From and after the passage of this act, the township of Lebanon, in the county of Lebanon, be and the same is hereby divided into two election districts, in manner following, to wit: all that part of the said township lying south of the Berks and Dauphin turnpike road, to compose one district, and all that part of said township lying north of the Berks and Dauphin turnpike road to compose one district, and that the south district shall hold their election in the grand jury room, and the north district in the traverse jury room, in the court house in the borough of Lebanon. SECTION 38. The electors residing within the limits of the south district in the township of Lebanon, aforesaid, shall on the day prescribed by law, hold their elections for inspector of the general elections and assessors at the place specified by the thirty-eighth section for holding their general elections; and the electors residing within the limits of the north district in said township, shall on the day aforesaid, hold their elections for inspector and assessors at the place specified by the aforesaid section for holding the general elections in said district. That that part of the township of Union, in the county of Huntingdon, beginning on the line of Bedford county, where the line of Springfield and Union townships meet, thence by the line between the two townships to a point on said line nearly opposite John Curfmans, so as to include his farm, thence by a straight line to the Hopewell township line, at Horshey's Gap, on Terrace Mountain, thence by the line of Hopewell and Union townships to the Bedford county line, thence by said line to the place of beginning, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors thereof shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house now occupied by John Henderson, in said election district.

Palmyra, Wayne. SECTION 41. The township election for electing supervisors, constables and other township officers in Palmyra township, in the county of Wayne, shall be held on the third Friday of February annually.

The township of Clinton, in the county of Wayne, shall hereafter be a separate election district, and the electors of said township, shall be held at the school house, situate on the Belmont and Easton turnpike road near the dwelling house of David Gaylord, in said township.

North Beaver, Beaver. SECTION 43. The citizens of North Beaver township, in the county of Beaver, shall hereafter hold their elections in the school house in the borough of Mount Jackson, in said township.

Allegheny, Venango. SECTION 44. The citizens of Allegheny township, in the county of Venango, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the house of Ebenezer Byles, in said township.

Deerfield, Warren. SECTION 45. The citizens of Deerfield township, in the county of Warren, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school house near to Samuel McGuires, in said township.

Separate election distr. in Perry co. SECTION 46. The hereinafter mentioned boundaries shall be a separate election district, viz: Beginning on the bank of the Juniata river on the lines between Centre and Wheatfield townships, thence across said river to the house of James Shields, in Buffalo township including said house, thence to the house of Thomas Boyd, including said house, thence the same course to the line between Buffalo and Greenwood townships, on the top of Buffalo mountain, thence along said line to Juniata river, thence across said river into Juniata township, thence up said river to the Rope ferry house, thence a straight line to the house of Samuel Musser, including said house, thence along the great road from said Musser's to the house of Peter Worts, including said house, thence a straight course to the

house belonging to the heirs of John Basler, including said house, thence the same course a straight line to the top of Limestone ridge, Centre township, thence along the summit of said ridge to intersect the line between Centre and Wheatfield townships, thence along said line to the place of beginning, and the elections to be hereafter held at the school house in Newport, in Perry county.

SECTION 47. The electors in the township of Little Britain, in the county of Lancaster, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the public house of Doctor John K. Sappington, in the said township, now occupied by William G. Chandler.

That part of Fannet township, in Franklin county, lying northward of the following line, viz: Beginning at the top of the Amberson Valley mountain where the road from Concord to Amberson's valley crosses the same, thence to a lane between James Doyle and Jacob Eby, thence to a lane between William Hays and Samuel Gamble, thence by a straight line to the top of the Tuscarora mountain, is hereby erected into a separate election district and shall hold their general and township elections at the school house in the town of Concord; and the part of said township lying southward of the aforesaid line shall be a separate election district, and shall hold their general and township elections at the school house on the lands of the heirs of Holliday and Wallace, in said township; and the thirteenth section of the act regulating election districts passed the fifteenth day of April, eighteen hundred and thirty-four, is hereby repealed.

That part of Shrewsbury township, in the county of York, which is now erected into a separate township, shall be called Springfield township, and be a separate election district, the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the house of Matthias Ness, in the town of Logansville.

Rackoon, Beaver. SECTION 69. The electors of Rackoon township, in the county of Beaver, shall hold their general elections at the house of Adam Kerr, in said county.

Southwark, Philadelphia. SECTION 70. The electors in the district of Southwark, county of Philadelphia, shall elect an additional constable for said district, at the same time and place, and in the same manner that the constables in said district are elected.

Delaware, Mercer. SECTION 71. The electors residing in that part of Delaware township, in Mercer county, which lays south of Shenango creek, and south of a line running due east from the numbered corner of donation lot, number seventy-eight, of five hundred acres, to the eastern boundary of said township, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the Court house in Mercer.

An Act

To incorporate the Yardleyville Delaware bridge company.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the capital stock of the Yardleyville Delaware bridge company, for the purpose of erecting a bridge over the river Delaware at the town of Yardleyville, in the county of Bucks, shall amount to twenty thousand dollars, with the privilege of increasing the same to thirty thousand dollars; and that the same shall be divided into fifty dollars each, and the subscribers to the said capital stock shall pay the sum or sums of money for the share or shares by them respectively subscribed at such periods and in such proportions as the directors of the said company may determine.
