AN ACT

To change the name of the "Marion Riflemen," to the George Washington Artillery," and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, the "Marion Riflemen," attached to the first battalion of Cumberland volunteers, shall be named instead thereof, the "George Washington Artillery," provided that all acts done under the former name of Marion riflemen, shall not be affected in any manner by this act.

SECTION 2. That the said company is hereby authorized to elect an ensign, in the same manner as is by law prescribed for the election of other commissioned officers of volunteer companies, and that as such he be entitled to receive a commission from the governor of this state.

SECTION 3. That it shall be the duty of the adjutant general to furnish, for the use of the Washington artillery, three field pieces, of the calibre of four pounds each, with all the apparatus and equipments complete; and it shall be the duty of the brigade inspector of the first brigade, eleventh division, Pennsylvania militia, to draw the said field pieces and equipments, and deliver the same to the company aforesaid, and the expense thereof shall be defrayed out of the state treasury, to be paid to the said brigade inspector upon the settlement of his account.

SECTION 4. That the commissioned officers shall receive commissions from the governor of the commonwealth for the respective offices they hold in the said company of Washington artillery.

SECTION 5. That the volunteer company organized and known by the name of "Dauphin Greys," in the borough of Harrisburg, and county of Dauphin, shall not be required to perform military duty, in connexion with any regiment or battalion, of militia remaining in other respects subject to the provisions of the militia law.

SECTION 6. That from and after the passage of this act, the "Jackson Rifle Rangers," of the thirty-fourth regiment, first brigade, seventh division, Pennsylvania militia, in the county of Monroe, shall be exempted from parading or drilling with any regiment or battalion of Militia, except at

- SECTION 7. That from and after the passage of this act, the seventh company, first battallion, one hundred and forty-second regiment, and tenth division, Pennsylvania militia, may hereafter meet in the town of New Washington, in the county of Clearfield, to do the duties imposed upon them by the militia laws of this commonwealth, and that so much of said laws as compels the said seventh company to meet to do military duty at any other place, be and the same is hereby repealed.

- SECTION 8. That from and after the passage of this act, the "Perry Hornets," a volunteer company, in the county of Perry, shall be exempted from parading or drilling with any regiment or battallion of militia, except at the discretion of the members of said company; but, in all other respects, to remain subject to the provisions of the militia laws of this commonwealth: *Provided*, The said "Perry Hornets" shall meet the proper number of days required by law in their company capacity.

- SECTION 9. That from and after the passage of this act, the Sewickly Blues, of the first battallion, Westmoreland volunteers, in the county of Westmoreland, shall be exempted from parading or drilling with any regiment or battallion of militia, except at the discretion of the members of said company: *Provided*, That the above named company shall meet the proper number of days required by law in their company capacity.

- SECTION 10. That from and after the passage of this act, the Union Guards, a volunteer company, in the county of Lehigh, shall be exempted from parading or drilling with any regiment or battallion of militia, except at the option of the members of said company; but in all other respects to remain subject to the provisions of the militia laws of this commonwealth: *Provided*, The said Union Guards shall meet the proper number of days required by law in their company capacity.

- SECTION 11. That from and after the passage of this act, the Washington Greens, in the county of York, and the Union Rangers, in the county of Bucks, shall be exempted from parading or drilling with any regiment or battallion of militia, except at the discretion of the members of said companies: *Provided*, That the above named companies shall meet the

AN ACT

To authorize the president and managers of the Huntingdon and Lewistown turnpike company, to alter the location of said turnpike through McVeytown.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the president and managers of Change of the Lewistown and Huntingdon turnpike road company, be location and they are hereby authorized and empowered to change the location of that portion of said road, which passes through McVeytown, in the county of Mifflin, and construct the same in and along Market street to Lumber street, and thence up Subject to li- Lumber street to the place where the said road now crosses bilities, &c said street, in said town, subject to all the liabilities and privileges imposed and granted by the original act incorporating said company.
