A N A C T

To repeal the resolution authorizing the widening of Callowhill street, in the county of Philadelphia, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That so much of the resolution to authorize the directors of the poor, and of the house of employment, of the county of Northampton, to sell and convey real estate, and administer oaths, and to authorize the school directors of the borough of Easton, in said county, to fix the minimum age at which children in said borough shall be admitted into the common schools, and for other purposes, as relates to the widening of Callowhill street, in the county of Philadelphia, and the provisos therein contained, passed the twenty-first day of April, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and forty, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Duty of Assessors in the city and incorporated dis. of Philad. co

SECTION 2. That it shall be the duty of the assessors, within the city and incorporated districts of the county of Philadelphia, in preparing the alphabetical lists and copies thereof of the white freemen residing within their respective wards as required by the fourth section of the act of thirteenth June, one thousand eight hundred and forty, entitled a supplement to an act entitled an act relating to the elections of this commonwealth, to insert thereon the occupation and place of residence of each of said white freemen, specifying the street and number of the house where such white freeman resides.

SECTION 3. That the said assessors shall, on inserting the additional names, as provided for by the fifth section of the said act, mark opposite thereto the occupation and residence of the person whose name is added to the list, and upon the duplicate copies required to be furnished to the officers of the election, the residences and occupations shall be marked as aforesaid.

Occupation of white freemen

SECTION 4. That the proceedings of "the commissioners and inhabitants of the township of Moyamensing," for and in establishing lamps and the nightly watch, in said township, be and the same are hereby confirmed; and it shall and may be lawful for the corporation aforesaid, at any time hereafter, when to them it shall seem proper, without petition or other application, to establish lamps and a nightly watch in any part of said township, the expense to be defrayed, by assessment, in that part of the township lighted and watched, and collected as other taxes of said township now are or may be assessed and collected, and all laws not consistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. That Barbara Hartman, trustee of Daniel Zeigenfuss and Catharine his wife, is hereby authorized to sell and convey at public or private sale, and make, execute and deliver a good and sufficient title for all that certain lot of ground situated in the borough of Easton, in the county of Northampton, bounded by Lehigh street, lands of John Keiter, Lewis Reichard, and others, extending on Lehigh street, thirty feet, and in depth fifty-five feet. *Provided*, That before such conveyance shall be made, the said trustee shall give bond to the Commonwealth, in such penalty and with such security as may be approved by the orphans' court of said county, conditioned for the faithful appropriation of the proceeds of sale, according to the true intent and meaning of said trust.

Proviso

SECTION 6. That all the right, title and interest which may be in this Commonwealth of, in or to the estate, real or personal, of Albertson Walton, late of Philadelphia county, deceased, by reason of any attainder, confiscation or forfeiture for or on account of any treason or misprison of treason charged or alleged against him, the said Albertson Walton, by virtue of any act or acts of assembly of this Commonwealth, be and the same is hereby released, so as to give to the said Albertson Walton, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, all the estate of which the said Albertson Walton, died seized, so far as the Commonwealth is interested therein, to be disposed of according to the provisions of his will, or by law, as fully and with like effect, to all intents and purposes, as though the said Albertson had never been attainted of

A N A C T

For the relief of John Woodcock and others, soldiers and widows of soldiers of the Revolutionary and Indian wars.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the state treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to pay unto John Woodcock, of Potter county, John Nicholas Kester, of Clinton county, Jane Harbison, late of Chester county, now of Wilmington, Delaware, Rebecca Blair, of Northumberland county, Ruth Mathiot, of Fayette county, and Jacob Dagon, of Washington county, soldiers and widows of soldiers of the Revolutionary and Indian wars, or to their respective orders, forty dollars each, immediately, as a gratuity, and an annuity of forty dollars each, during life, payable half yearly, to commence on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one.
