AN ACT

Repealing so much of the act as authorizes the election of two Constables in the Borough of Bristol, in the county of Bucks, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the eighty-eighth section of the act passed the fourteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty, entitled "An act regulating election districts, and for other purposes," be and the same is hereby repealed: *Provided,* That both persons elected constables under the provisions of that act, shall serve until the expiration of the term for which they were respectively elected.

Elections in Girard tp Clearfield co

SECTION 2. That the election of officers for the borough of Manyunk, in the county of Philadelphia, shall be held at the lockup house, in the said borough, on the first Monday of March, eighteen hundred and forty-two, and annually thereafter.

SECTION 3. That the qualified voters of Girard township, in the county of Clearfield, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Mordecai Livergood, in said township.

SECTION 4. That so much of the act relating to counties and townships, and county and township officers, passed the fifteenth day of April, Anno Domini, eighteen hundred and thirty-four, as is repealed, except as to certain counties therein named by the act entitled "A supplement to the act relating to county rates and levies, and to the act relating to counties and townships, and county and township officers," passed the twenty-eighth day of February, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, be and the same is hereby revived, so far as regards the township of Pitt, in the county of Allegheny, and the treasurer who shall be elected by a majority of the votes polled at the township election, shall give bond with sureties to the satisfaction, to the auditors in double the amount of all the township taxes, and shall collect said taxes in money, and disburse the same on the orders of the supervisors and school directors, as drawn on their respective funds, for which he shall be allowed six per cent. on the amount collected and paid.

Part of former act revived relating to Pitt tp Allegheny co

SECTION 5. The accounts of the township officers of the said township of Pitt, shall be settled four weeks previous to

each annual election, and the auditors after settling said accounts, shall fix the rates of poor and road taxes for the ensuing year, and publish the same, together with the accounts of the year, as settled by them, in hand bills, to be posted publicly in said township, fifteen days previous to the election, and the supervisors shall as far as practicable, contract for the work to be done in opening and repairing the roads.

SECTION 6. That it shall be lawful for the town council of the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Allegheny, annually at the first regular meeting after their election, and whenever any vacancy shall occur in the said office, to appoint one person to serve as collector of the taxes assessed within the said borough, in pursuance of the ordinances and regulations thereof, who shall before entering on the duties of his office, give bond in such amount and with such security, as shall be required by the said council, conditioned for the diligent and faithful performance thereof, and that so much of the act incorporating the said borough, as authorizes and requires the high constable thereof, to perform the duties of a collector of borough taxes, be and the same is hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. That no contract for the payment of money to the said borough, or to the burgesses and town council thereof, shall be adjudged void, nor shall any suit or action now pending, or hereafter to be brought thereon, be abated, or the plaintiff or plaintiffs non-suited, or in any respect affected on the trial thereof, by reason of the fact, that the same may have been founded on an issue of certificates of stock, or loan by the said corporation, intended to be circulated as money, and in violation of any of the acts of assembly of this Commonwealth, prohibiting the issue and circulation of small notes.
