RESOLUTIONS

Relative to the Repeal of the Sub-Treasury Law.

1. **RESOLVED**, *By the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met*, That our senators in congress be and they are hereby instructed, and our representatives requested, to vote for the repeal of the act entitled "An act to provide for the collection, safe keeping, transfer and disbursement of the public revenue," approved the fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty, commonly called the sub-treasury bill, and also to vote for any resolutions that have been or may be introduced in either house of congress, declaring such repeal to be expedient. Instructions

2. **RESOLVED**, That the Governor of this Commonwealth be requested to cause the foregoing resolution to be transmitted to each of our Senators and representatives in the congress of the United States, with the request that the same may be laid before their respective houses.
