

**Penalty** Cashier, such Cashier upon conviction thereof, in any court of criminal jurisdiction, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred and not exceeding five hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment in the common jail for any period of not less than one nor more than five years.

**Toll and revenue what medium paid** SECTION 8. That hereafter no medium shall be received in the payment of tolls, taxes or other revenue of the Commonwealth, other than gold and silver, the notes of specie paying banks or the legal issues under the act of fourth May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one: *Provided*, That this section shall not be construed as a repeal of a resolution passed at the present session of the legislature, in relation to tolls for carrying the mail on the Columbia rail road.

## A N A C T

To enable the Commissioners of Greene county to sell and convey certain real estate, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the commissioners of the county of Greene, are hereby authorized and empowered to sell and convey to the trustees of the Baptist church, and their successors of the borough of Waynesburg, in the county aforesaid, for the purpose of erecting a house of worship thereon, all the right, title and claim, of said borough, in and to the following described lot or piece of ground, to-wit: Beginning at the west end of the town of Waynesburg, on Main street, and running eight feet in front on the said street, thence north one hundred and eighty feet, next to and parallel with West street, containing more or less.

**Com'rs of Greene co to sell real estate**

SECTION 2. The proceeds of the said sale shall be appropriated to the use of the borough of Waynesburg, after deducting all expenses by the commissioners aforesaid, as the burgess and town council may direct. Proceeds how disposed of

SECTION 3. That the citizens of the borough of West Newton, in the county of Westmoreland, shall at the ensuing election, elect an assessor and assistant assessor, and shall hereafter assess, levy and collect their county and state tax, and pay over the same to the county treasurer; subject to the provisions of the acts of Assembly, regulating the assessments of the several townships in this commonwealth, and said borough, shall be, and is hereby erected into a separate school district, to enjoy all the benefits incident thereto. Separate school district

SECTION 4. That Ephraim L. Blain, of Washington county, and James H. Patterson and John Gadd, of Fayette county, be and they are hereby appointed commissioners, to view, lay out and mark a state road from Bentleysville, in Washington county, by way of Greenfield, in said county, to Connellsville, in Fayette county. Com'rs to lay out a state road from Washington co Fayette co

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the said commissioners, or a majority of them, (after having been sworn or affirmed before some justice of the peace, who shall file and preserve the same in his office, to perform the duties enjoined on them by this act with impartiality and fidelity,) carefully to view the ground over which the road laid out by them may pass, and lay out the same on the most suitable and proper ground; and that they shall clearly and distinctly mark upon the ground the route agreed; and for the purpose of fulfilling the duties in this act enjoined, the commissioners herein mentioned, shall receive one dollar and fifty cents for every day they shall be necessarily employed in performing their duties under this act, and the said commissioners are authorized to employ one surveyor at two dollars per day, two chain bearers, and one axeman at a per diem allowance not exceeding one dollar. Duty of com'rs  
Pay

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the said commissioners, to make out a fair and accurate draft of the location of said road, noting thereon the courses and distances as they occur, the improvements passed through, and also the crossing of county and township lines, roads and waters, with such other matters as may serve for explanation, one copy whereof shall be deposited in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth on or before the first Monday of November next, and one copy in the office of the Clerk of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the respective counties through which said road may pass, on the day aforesaid, or as much sooner as practicable, which shall be a record thereof. Draft

SECTION 7. The accounts of the said commissioners for their own pay, and for the pay of surveyors, chain carriers and

Act of com'rs markers shall be adjusted by the commissioners of the respective counties through which said road shall pass, and paid by the treasurers thereof on warrants drawn in the usual way in proportion to the length of the road in such county respectively.

First meeting SECTION 8. The said commissioners shall meet on or before the first Monday of August next, or as soon thereafter as practicable, at such places as a majority of them shall agree upon, and complete the location of said road as soon as practicable; and if any vacancy or vacancies shall happen by resignation or any other cause, the court of quarter sessions of the proper county, as the case may be, are hereby authorized to fill the vacancy or vacancies by a suitable appointment.

Governor authorized to supervise public grounds &c SECTION 9. That the Governor be and he is hereby authorized to exercise a general supervision of so much of the public ground as is enclosed on Capitol Hill, and to employ some suitable person to keep the same in order and repair, and to replant ornamental trees and shrubbery if he deems it expedient to have the same done; also to have the fence around the said ground kept up and repaired whenever it may be necessary to do so.

Appropriation And that the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars be, and hereby is appropriated, to be applied by the Governor for the purpose of defraying the expenses incident to the keeping in repair the ground and fencing aforesaid, and the taking care of the same, which sum shall be drawn from the treasury upon the Governor's warrant in favor of the person or persons so employed, and to be accounted for on the settlement with him.

Penalty for injuring public property SECTION 10. That if any person or persons shall wilfully, or maliciously break down any tree or shrub growing in said enclosure, or otherwise injure or destroy the same, or shall injure, break or destroy the fence around said enclosure or any part thereof, or shall maliciously or wilfully injure any part of the public grounds, or the buildings belonging to the state, he or they shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and liable to be punished therefor, by indictment and fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, at the discretion of the court.

Former act repealed SECTION 11. That the resolution entitled "Resolution relative to the preservation and repair of the public buildings, and the improvement of the public grounds," approved May twenty-second, eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, be and the same is hereby repealed.
