In the Senate, November 9, 1931.

Resolved (if the House of Representatives concur), That the State Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay, on warrant of the Auditor General, to each Member of the General Assembly the sum of \$250.00 on account of the salary of \$500.00 to which each member is entitled for an extraordinary session of the General Assembly, by virtue of the provisions of the act of Assembly, approved the tenth day of May, A. D. 1927, P. L. 880; and the balance of said \$500.00, namely \$250.00, on the day of final adjournment of the extraordinary session of the General Assembly, convened in session on call of the Governor, November 9, 1931.

I do hereby certify that the concurrent resolution, passed by the General Assembly, in special session, on November 10, 1931, authorizing "the State Treasurer \* \* \* to pay, on warrant of the Auditor General, to each Member of the General Assembly the sum of \$250.00 on account of the salary of \$500.00 to which each member is entitled for an extraordinary session of the General Assembly, \* \* \*," was presented to the Governor on the tenth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, and was not returned within ten days after it had been presented to him, wherefore it has, agreeably to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, become a law in like manner as if he had signed it.
