## AN ACT

Authorizing the Secretary of the Commonwealth, with the approval of the presiding officers of the General Assembly, the Attorney General, and Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, to correct certain errors in the original copies of laws.

Pamphlet Laws.

Correction of errors by Secretary of the Commonwealth.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That where any law shall have been finally enacted and it shall be ascertained that such law is technically defective in form, or contains misspelled words or typographical errors, or the plural or singular appears where the opposite should be used, the Secretary of the Commonwealth, in punctuating and editing such law, shall have authority, with the approval of the President pro tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, and the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, to correct the original copy of such law, as filed in the Department of State, if such correction will not in any manner affect or change the meaning, intent or substance of such law.

Section 2. Whenever any correction on any law is made as hereinbefore authorized, a notation thereof shall be made on the original copy by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, together with his signature, followed by the approval and signatures of the President pro tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, and the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau.

When effective.

Section 3. This act shall become effective immediately upon its final enactment.

## AN ACT

To amend section fifty-four of the act, approved the second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine (Pamphlet Laws, one thousand two hundred seventy-eight), entitled "An act relating to counties of the second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth classes; and revising, amending and consolidating the laws relating thereto," permitting individual sureties on the bonds of county officers in counties of the sixth, seventh and eighth classes, and regulating and controlling the acceptance of such bonds.
