AN ACT

To amend section two hundred and twenty-seven of the act, approved the second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine (Pamphlet Laws, one thousand two hundred seventy-eight), entitled "An act relating to counties of the second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth classes; and revising, amending and consolidating the laws relating thereto," by changing the method of appointing minute clerks of the courts of common pleas, and courts of quarter sessions and over and terminer in counties of the second class.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That section two hundred and twenty-seven of the act, approved the second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine (Pamphlet Laws, one thousand two hundred seventyeight), entitled "An act relating to counties of the second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth classes; and revising, amending and consolidating the laws relating thereto," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 227. In Counties of the Second Class, Ap- Minute clerks. pointment of Minute Clerks by [Prothonotary and Clerk of Courts the Courts of Common Pleas, and Courts of Quarter Sessions and Oyer and Terminer. The prothonotary and the clerk of the courts of quarter sessions and over and terminer, in counties of the second class, may, with the approval of the court of common pleas, or the courts of quarter sessions and over and terminer, as the case may be In counties of the second class the court of common pleas, and the court of quarter sessions and over and terminer shall respectively appoint minute clerks of said courts. Such clerks shall receive such salaries as the court [authorizing] making their appointment may fix, and shall give bond in such sum as the respective courts may direct. This act shall not affect the power of the prothonotary of Allegheny County to appoint clerks of the county court for the County of Allegheny, under the provisions of section five of the act, approved the fifth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven (Pamphlet Laws, one hundred and ninety-eight), entitled "An act to establish a county court for the county of Allegheny, and prescribing its powers and duties; regulating the procedure therein; and providing for the expenses thereof," or its amendments.
