

## APPROPRIATION ACTS,

No. 94-A.

## AN ACT

Making an appropriation to the Moore Institute of Art, Science and Industry, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. The sum of seventy-one thousand five hundred dollars (\$71,500) is hereby specifically appropriated to the Moore Institute of Art, Science and Industry, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for the two fiscal years beginning June first, one thousand nine hundred fifty-seven: Provided, That in such school there shall be maintained a free one-year scholarship, annually, for one pupil of each senatorial district in the State to be filled by appointment of the senator of each such district.

## AN ACT

To provide for the ordinary expenses of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth interest on the public debt and for public schools for two years beginning June 1, 1957, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending May 31, 1957.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "General Appropriation Act of 1957."

Section 2. The following sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the General Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the payment of the salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expense of the duly elected or appointed officers and employes of the Commonwealth, for payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods, services, printing, equipment, land and buildings, and for payment of any other expenses as provided by law or by this act necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the two years beginning June 1, 1957, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending May 31, 1957.

Section 3. This act is not intended to be inconsistent with, or to repeal, any provision of any act enacted at this or any prior session of the General Assembly regulating the purchase of supplies, the ordering of printing and binding, the purchase, maintenance and use of automobiles, the method of making payments from the State Treasury for any purpose or the functioning of any administrative department, board or commission.

Section 4. No appropriation made by this act to any department, board, commission or agency of the Executive Department shall be available unless and until such department, board, commission or agency shall have complied with sections 604, 605 and 606 of The Administrative Code.



Section 5. The term "employees" as used in this act, shall include all directors, superintendents, bureau or division chiefs, assistant directors, assistant superintendents, assistant chiefs, experts, scientists, engineers, surveyors, draftsmen, accountants, secretaries, auditors, inspectors, examiners, statisticians, marshals, clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, messengers and other assistants in any department, board or commission.

Section 6. The terms "expenses" and "maintenance" shall include all printing, binding and stationery, food and forage materials, and supplies, traveling expenses, motor vehicle supplies, and repairs, freight, express and cartage, postage, telephone and telegraph, rentals and toll charges, newspaper advertising and notices, fuel, light, heat, power and water, repairs or reconstruction of equipment, buildings and facilities, rent of real estate and equipment, premiums on workmen's compensation insurance, premiums on policies of liability insurance covering the operation of permanently assigned automobiles, premiums on surety bonds, the purchase of replacement or additional equipment and machinery other than passenger motor vehicles, and all other incidental costs and expenses, including payment to the Department of Property and Supplies of mileage charges for the use of automobiles, and of expenses or costs of services incurred through the Purchasing Fund.

Section 7. Purchase of supplies, materials and equipment shall not be deemed to be committed or encumbered until contracts covering said purchases have been entered into with the vendors.

Section 8. That part of all appropriations in this act unexpended, uncommitted and unencumbered as of May 31, 1959, shall automatically lapse as of that date.

Section 9. The provisions of this act shall be severable. If any provision of this act is found by a court of record to be unconstitutional and void, the remaining provisions of the act shall nevertheless remain valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the law are so essentially and inseparably connected with and depend upon the void provision that it cannot be presumed the Legislature would have enacted the remaining valid provisions without the void one, or unless the court finds the remaining valid provisions standing alone are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.

APPROVED—The 19th day of July, A. D. 1957, except as to the following items:

To the Lieutenant Governor

The item which provides as follows:

"For the salaries, wages and all other expenses necessary for the proper conduct of the office of the Lieutenant Governor as provided in Section 702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 . . . . . \$ 50,000"

I approve this item in the amount of \$45,500.

I withhold my approval from the remainder of said item for the reason that I feel the independent constitutional offices should be ac-

corded equal treatment in the matter of appropriations for the conduct of their offices. This bill provides no increase over the 1955-1957 biennium for the salaries and expense appropriation of the Treasury Department and only three-tenths of one percent increase for the Department of Internal Affairs. I therefore approve this item in the amount of the appropriation for the 1955-1957 biennium.

To the Department of the Auditor General

The item which provides as follows:

“For the salaries, wages and all other expenses necessary for the proper conduct of the following purposes and activities:

Administration of the Department of the Auditor General as provided in Sections 706 and 1001 of The Administrative Code of 1929 . . . . . \$ 2,730,000”

I approve this item in the amount of \$1,831,604.

I withhold my approval from \$248,578 for the reason stated above as to increases for the independent constitutional offices; the amount approved providing an increase of three-tenths of one percent over the 1955-1957 appropriation. I withhold my approval from an additional \$649,818 because of the provisions of Act 114, approved May 31, 1957, which appropriates directly to the department the proceeds of the audit charges to be levied during the biennium against special funds. These receipts were previously deposited in the General Fund as general revenue and an appropriation made to the department for the costs of performing these audits.
