SB 128

Amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), entitled "An act relating to alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto; regulating and restricting the manufacture, purchase, sale, possession, consumption, importation, transportation, furnishing, holding in bond, holding in storage, traffic in and use of alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages and the persons engaged or employed therein; defining the powers and duties of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; providing for the establishment and operation of State liquor stores, for the payment of certain license fees to the respective municipalities and townships, for the abatement of certain nuisances and, in certain cases, for search and seizure without warrant; prescribing penalties and forfeitures; providing for local option, and repealing existing laws," further providing for special occasion permits.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section 408.4(c) of the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the Liquor Code, amended July 9, 1984 (P.L.659, No.137), is amended to read:

Section 408.4. Special Occasion Permits.—* * *

(c) Such special occasion permit shall only be valid for the number of days stated in the permit. Only one permit may be issued to any permittee during the year. Provided, that a museum operated by a nonprofit corporation in a city of the third class and a nonprofit corporation engaged in the performing arts in a city of the third class may be issued no more than six permits during the year, each permit being valid for only one day, or in the alternative, one permit valid for no more than a total of ten consecutive days per year, which may be issued only during the **[period from August 17 to August 26, 1984] month of August.**

* * *

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
