CHAPTER MDCCLXXX.

An ACT to erect an additional election district in Westmoreland county.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That that part of Westmoreland county included within the following bounds is hereby erected into a separate election district, to be called South Huntingdon district; beginning on the Chesnut Ridge, at the division line between the townships of Mount-Pleasant and Donegal, where the road known by the name of Williams's road crosses said line; thence along said road westward to Jacob Painter, Esquire's mill, on Sewickley creek; thence down said creek to Youghiogeny river; thence up said river to the mouth of Jacob's creek; thence up said creek, being the division line between Westmoreland and Fayette counties, and bounding on said division line, to the line dividing Tyrone and Mount-Pleasant townships; thence along said line to the place of beginning; and the freemen of the said district shall hold their annual elections at the house now occupied by Jacob Hough, junior.*

South Huntingdon election district in Westmoreland county erected.
