A Steer, Bull, or Cow-hyde, shall pay 12 pence . . .

A Beaver Skin shall pay 9 pence . . .

All peltry to the value of a beaver 9 pence . . .

For ever pound weight of deer skins 1/2 pence . . .

And whosoever Shall be found to Export any of the aforesaid Skins, Contrary to the true meaning and intent of this act, shall forfeit to the Governor one-third of those Skins not duly entred, and one third more to the discoverer.

CHAPTER 99.

LAW ABOUT LICENSING ORDINARYS.

Chap: 99 And be it &c: That no person within this Province or territories therof, shall presume to keep an Ordinary without a License first obtained of the Governor, to the end that all travellers, & such as are not house-keepers may be reasonably accommodated in places where Ordinarys now are, or shall be hereafter keept, No such keeper of an Ordinary shall demand above 7 1/2 pence a meal by the head, Which meal shall Consist of beer or pork or such like produce of the Countrie & small beer, And of a footman hee shall not demand above two pennies a night for his bed, And of a horse-man nothing, hee paying Six pence a Night for his horses hay or grass And in Case any person shall keep an Ordinary without License, such person shall forfeit 5 pounds And if any one shall presume to ask more than is herein expressed, shall forfeit 5 shillings for every such offence.
