

CHAPTER MCDV.

AN ACT TO REPEAL SO MUCH OF AN ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT FOR RAISING AND COLLECTING OF MONEY ON THE SPECIFIED ARTICLES THEREIN MENTIONED FOR THE SUPPORT OF GOVERNMENT AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES THEREIN MENTIONED"¹ AS IMPOSES A TAX ON OWNERS OR POSSESSORS OF ANY ONE-HORSE TWO-WHEELED SULKY, SOLO, CHAIR OR CHAISE OR ANY COVERED FAMILY WAGON COMMONLY CALLED A CARAVAN.

(Section I, P. L.) Whereas it appears to this house that so much of the act entitled, "An act for raising and collecting of money on the specified articles therein mentioned for the support of government and for other purposes therein mentioned" passed the twentieth day of March one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three as directs the raising, levying and collecting annually from the owners or possessors of any one-horse two-wheeled sulky, solo, chair or chaise or of any covered family wagon commonly called a caravan greatly discourages the manufacturers of those useful carriages and lays a very heavy and unequal burden upon many of the citizens of this state:

[Section I.] (Section II, P. L.) Be it therefore enacted and it is hereby enacted by the Representatives of the Freemen of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met and by the authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this act so much of the above recited act as directs the raising, levying and collecting the taxes in the said recited act specified from the owners or possessors of any one-horse two-wheeled sulky, solo, chair or chaise or of any covered family wagon commonly called a caravan, be, and the same is hereby repealed and made void, anything in the said recited act to the contrary notwithstanding.
