prison in Philadelphia, by virtue of this act, and of the thirteenth section of the act, of which this is amendatory, as might or could be had or used to obtain possession of the said lots if the same continued to be the property of this commonwealth.

CHAPTER MMDCCCXXVIII.

AN ACT GRANTING A SUM OF MONEY TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UNION ACADEMY OF DOYLESTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF BUCKS, FOR THE USE OF SAID ACADEMY.

Section I. (Section I, P. L.) Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the sum of eight hundred dollars be, and the same is hereby granted to the trustees of the Union Academy of Doylestown; to assist and enable them to finish said academy; to be paid by a warrant to be drawn by the governor on the state treasurer, out of any unappropriated money in the state treasury.

Section II. (Section II, P. L.) And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That there shall be admitted into said academy, any number of poor children who may at any time be offered, in order to be taught gratis: Provided, the number so admitted shall at no time exceed three, and that none of the said children shall continue to be taught gratis more than one year.⁽¹⁾
