CHAPTER MMDCCCLIX.

AN ACT FOR THE RELIEF OF THE REPRESENTATIVES OF JOHN FROM-BERGER, DECEASED.

Whereas Thomas Laurence, James Budden and John Dunlap, of the city of Philadelphia, purchased of the agents for forfeited estates, a tract of land in the township of the Northern Liberties, containing about thirty acres, more or less, confiscated to this commonwealth, as the estate of a certain Joseph Griswold, which said tract of land came by divers mesne conveyances to John Fromberger, of the city of Philadelphia, in fee, who on the fourth day of February, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and two, was regularly evicted therefrom by reason of a title paramount, in a certain Joseph Griswold, of the city of New York: And whereas, it is just and reasonable that the representatives of the said John Fromberger, who is now deceased, should be relieved from the loss arising from the failure of the title from this commonwealth; Therefore,

Section I. (Section I, P. L.) Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the governor be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw his warrant upon the treasury, in favor of John Gryner and Jacob Chrystler, administrators to the estate of John Fromberger, deceased, for the sum of one thousand dollars, as a full compensation to the representatives of the said Fromberger, for all losses, by reason of his eviction from a certain tract of land in the township of the Northern Liberties, containing about thirty acres and derived by him from a sale by the agents of forfeited estates, which said warrant shall be paid out of any unappropriated monies in the treasury.
